Semington Primary School - one of the best performing schools in Wiltshire (Melksham Independent News Headline)

St George's C of E Primary in Semington has recently been congratulated by Wiltshire County Council for their incredible end of KS2 SAT results from last summer. In the words of the Director of Education and Skills the school's performance was 'amongst the best primary schools in Wiltshire.' 78% of our Y6 pupils achieved the expected standard in reading, writing and mathematics combined (compared to a national average of 64%). What is also incredible is the fact that 33% of those pupils were achieving at a higher standard (working at greater depth).

The letter also recognised all of the 'sustained commitment, hard work and success of the staff, governors and pupils' that goes into such a huge improvement. The school, in conjunction with all stakeholders, have worked tirelessly to improve outcomes for the children in the school since it was put into Special Measures back in March 2017. We continue to aim high for all of our pupils for this academic year.

Parish Council Issues

No Entry Gate

Melksham Police have been monitoring vehicles unlawfully driving through the no entry point near the Air Ambulance HQ and advising them of the consequences of their actions. They found that on those occasions "the majority of people driving through the no entry were village residents" and requested this item be included in the magazine pointing out that the result could be £100 fine and 3 licence points. I would also add that this is undermining the Parish Council's efforts to prevent the the village returning to the days of high volume through traffic.

On-Street Parking

This is a reminder to for us all to keep clear access in the village for emergency vehicles, particularly on narrow roads such as Pound Lane and Church Street. Fire engines for example require at least 4 metres of space and significantly more at corners.

Litter Clearance

On a lighter note, the Parish Council would like to thank Lee Norris who, with Ron Robinson's assistance, has been regularly keeping the village clear of litter. Our thanks also to Barry Norris who kindly removed a metal trip hazard from the village hall car park.

THE LITTLE STRANGER

SATURDAY 27th APRIL 2019 – 7.30pm (DOORS OPEN AT 7.00PM FOR REFRESHMENTS) AT THE VILLAGE HALL. STEEPLE ASHTON



Based on the novel of the same name by Sarah Waters, this is probably best described as an 'atmospheric mystery drama' but it could be said that it relies on the mysterious atmosphere rather than the drama!

The Little Stranger tells the story of Dr. Faraday (**Domhnall Gleeson** – son of Brendon), the son of a housemaid, who has built a life of quiet respectability as a country doctor. During the long hot summer of 1947, he is called to a patient at Hundreds Hall, where his mother once worked. The Hall has been home to the Ayres family for more than two centuries, but it is now in decline and its inhabitants – mother, Mrs Ayres (**Charlotte Rampling**), son, Roderick (**Will Poulter**) and daughter, Caroline (**Ruth Wilson**) - are haunted by something more ominous than a outdated way of life. When he takes on his new patient, Dr. Faraday has no idea how closely the family's story is about to become entwined with his own.

'Two hours can't do justice to the slow build up of tension achieved in the novel, yet it's an atmospheric and engrossing piece, which never drags despite a certain lack of action. Nevertheless this is an entertaining film, and worth watching.' (An audience members' review)

Parish Council Minutes

Abridged minutes from meeting held on 13th March 2019

Present: Councillors B Smyth (Chairman), P Bowyer, R Oglesby, S Rimmer, W Scott, P Smith, C Wade and the Clerk, Roger Coleman. There was one member of the public present initially.

Apologies: Apologies for non-attendance were received from Parish Councillors M Kasasian and R Robinson and from Wiltshire Council Cllr. J Seed and PCSO Maggie Ledbury.

Community Policing. PCSO Ledbury of the Community Policing Team had sent the Clerk the February monthly report that he had subsequently sent to all councillors. Reported crimes in Semington for February 2019: Unknown suspects have let all tyres down on a vehicle and there had been criminal damage to metal gate — Semington Area. Cllr. Wade stated that he had received a report of a firearm — presumed to be an air-rifle — being used against deer in a field with the shot damaging nearby property. He added that the police were also aware of this incident, although no action had been taken to date.

Wiltshire Council Report. In the absence of Cllr. Seed there was no report.

Planning. The following planning application was received after 7th March 2019. The Council examined this application and <u>resolved</u> to send comments to Wiltshire Council: 19/02523/FUL 15 Somerset Way, ground and first floor extension. The Parish Council has no objections to this proposed development. Cllr. Scott reported that he had not yet been notified by Wiltshire Council that an Inspector had been appointed for the Village Green Enquiry or the date of the Enquiry. Councillors agreed that the comments to be sent to the Boundary Commission in respect of the Local Government Boundary Review would be agreed at the next Meeting noting that comments had to be received by the Boundary Commission no later than 15th April 2019.

Finance. Total balance as at 13th March £23,671.23 The decision whether to transfer funds to the Tennis Court Maintenance A/C and the amount, if any, to be transferred was deferred until a subsequent meeting. The Chairman stated that he is continuing to seek this information from the contractor.

The Council indicated that it would support the renewal of the defibrillator contract with South West Ambulance Service and that a formal proposition to agree the £1800 plus VAT fee would be put to the Parish Council at the next meeting. The current contract expires on 6 May 2019.

Highways/Environment Cllr Smyth reported that the cuttings strewn across Pound Lane following hedge cutting and reported to the Parish Council by a parishioner had now been cleared away. Cllr. Scott stated that brambles from the 'church field' were very overgrown and that they were obstructing an adjoining footpath. It was agreed that the owner/tenant of the field will be contacted. The Chairman stated that he and Cllr. Robinson had surveyed the footways in the village and had identified a length of High Street – footways on both sides of the road – especially from The Hunt Close to Pound Lane as being in a very poor condition. The footways were broken up in many places with grass growing in them. He added that he had reported these defects and the locations to Wiltshire Council, namely Rhys Schell (as previously requested by him).

Cllr. Oglesby stated that Cllr. Robinson and Mr Lee Norris continue to undertake litter picking in the village on a regular basis. Councillors commented that the litter picking was undertaken on a voluntary basis for the benefit of the community and the tidiness of the village, in comparison to some others, was largely due to their efforts. The Council expressed its thanks to Cllr. Robinson and Lee Norris.

The Clerk stated that although he had been requested to contact the Operations Manager, Wiltshire Air Ambulance owing to the difficulty in contacting him experienced by Cllr. Smyth, he had had a conversation with Wiltshire Police (Insp. James Williams) who had confirmed that Wiltshire Police were very unlikely to support the 'Enforcement Camera' project because of lack of police resources The Clerk commented that in a discussion with Cllr. Smyth it was agreed not to press the Wiltshire Air Ambulance for financial support for this project until support from Wiltshire Police could be assured. Cllr. Smyth stated that very recently he had managed to contact the Operations Manager and had discussed the issue of the Bus Gate and the subject of the 'Enforcement Camera' and although all the discussions were good-mannered, no specific agreements resulted.

Councillors commented that the police presence at the bus gate had proved very successful in identifying errant motorists and motorcyclists and issuing them with a fixed penalty notice (£100) and three points on their licence.

Semington Village Website. Councillors confirmed that the Working Group comprising Cllrs. Kasasian, Rimmer, Robinson and Scott had met and had reviewed the current website content. It was noted that Cllr. Robinson had also individually contacted the webmaster with various ideas for improving the website. Cllr. Scott gave a report on the findings of the Working Group and explained the possible improvements to it and gave an example of a 'home page'. There ensued a general discussion on the website and possible changes to it and it was agreed that the Working Party would meet up with the webmaster to agree with him the changes considered necessary and to present this agreement to the Parish Council for endorsement.

Your Wiltshire Councillor News

Spring is here and Easter beckons as you read this message. The dark winter days are past and the longer warmer and brighter weather is in front of us. There is also brighter news on the political front with a series of positive announcements from Wiltshire Council. These all come from a carefully constructed budget which Wiltshire Council is now delivering and one which included over £25 million of efficiencies. However the Council has also received additional and targeted funding for specific service areas from central government and has put aside its own local funding to invest in these and other critical services.

Over the next few years an additional £20 million will be invested in our roads with an additional £8 million being invested during the forthcoming financial year. This includes £3 million spending on road surfacing, £1 million on footway repairs, and £900k on pothole repair and patching. This is really good news for our long suffering county motorists and cyclists alike and also good news for pedestrians. In every town and parish we also continue to see the much valued Parish Stewards going about their very local business of smaller but equally important maintenance and repair jobs.

We have good news in other service areas. This is particularly important in children's services who look after the future generation of Moonrakers. In this area it is great to see that 98% of our children are being allocated a place at their first choice of secondary school. The Council is also continuing to invest in the health of our children and is one of very few councils in the country to provide free swimming for the under 16s during the school holidays. Not only that but we still have the same number of swimming pools that we had in 2009 (when Wiltshire Council was created) for our residents and our children to swim in. Add to all of this that several of these swimming pools are newly built or totally refurbished (and one more new one is planned) and perhaps spring really is here in local government!

Finally Semington is determined to tackle the abuse of the bus gate on the Melksham Road which is being used as an illegal shortcut by motorists. Instead of merely being monitored by the Community Gatewatch team enforcement action is now being taken. So motorists that persist in making this illegal journey now face prosecution and sanctions with possible points on their driving licences. Offenders beware!

Do You Have Land For Trees?

Steve Rimmer

We have planted nearly 700 trees in Semington mainly on the wide grass verge on Littlemarsh adjacent to the football ground and they have been provided free of charge by The Woodland Trust.

We can still obtain 'free' trees upon application to the Woodland Trust as long as we can identify where we intend to plant, we also need the permission of the landowner and the general public must have free access to the area. Trees ordered now will be delivered in November which is an ideal time to plant when the trees are dormant and they can look forward to getting a good start in good (damp) soil conditions in the spring.

Tree packs can be as large as 420 trees which will need a field about half the size of a football pitch, but you could also consider tree packs of 105 trees or 30 trees.

You may wish to consider an urban tree pack consisting of 5 crab apple, 5 hazel and 5 rowan trees and these can be shared between neighbours. They meet the criteria for free trees as long as they are to be planted in front gardens where they will 'green up' the environment and be visible to passers by: Visit the Woodland Trust website:

If you own land to which you would not want the general public to have access, you can still obtain subsidised tree packs from The Woodland Trust. There are a variety of pack sizes, but a good starting point might be to plant a shelter belt of 210 "Whips" which would cost £108.25.

An Open Letter to The Village of Semington

David Philpott - Chief Executive, Wiltshire Air Ambulance

It is almost a year now since we moved our lifesaving service into the purpose-built airbase opposite Outmarsh Farm. During the 10 months that we have been here, we have been overwhelmed by the warm welcome and many kindnesses we have been shown by residents of Semington, most of whom really value what we do.

Indeed, since we started operations from our 'new home' and until the end of February 2019, we have flown 365 missions by air and attended a further 583 in rapid response vehicles, often to Semington and the surrounding villages.

One outstanding matter – and one that is especially pertinent to the people in this village – centres around the bus gate. I'm aware there has been some suggestion that our charity has reneged on a promise to move it but this is not true.

As things stand, the Wiltshire Council planning authority do not want the bus gate moved and therefore we would be breaking the law should we unilaterally decide to do so. If this matter changed, we would work with Wiltshire Council and the parish council to come to the best solution for the bus gate in the future.

We also understand there is now a suggestion that cameras be affixed to the bus gate to deter unlawful use as, according to the parish council, 'more disturbing is the number of parishioners ignoring the bus gate restrictions and...if left unchallenged, the benefit of the bus gate for the villagers of Semington would be lost'.

Indeed we would welcome the publication of metrocount figures that suggest less vehicles are driving through the village since we relocated here, which in turn might allay concerns about the bus gate.

Once more, thank you for the very kind welcome we have been afforded since moving to Semington and we look forward to many years of happily operating from our airbase north of the village.
