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Parish Council Matters

Local Plans: Wiltshire Council consultation – by the time you read this, the parish council will have held an extraordinary meeting on **24**th **February** to consider and approve the village's response to this. The plans will have an impact on village development now and into the future. Hopefully, you will have been able to join that meeting to have your say. The text of our response can be found at **www.semington.org.uk** under the "Planning" menu.

Problems in the village – these have in the past few weeks included; fly-tipping, fast driving in Little Marsh, wild camping, and anti-social behaviour both in Little Marsh and along the High Street. The authorities have been informed and our very supportive local PCSO and her colleagues will be increasing their presence in the village. Thanks to all parishioners who helped identify and report problems, and to clear up the mess. As always, if you see something happening that isn't right, report it to the relevant authority. Once out of lockdown, we aim to revive the Neighbourhood Watch Scheme, please see Siobhan's article on page 21.

Community meeting on possible development of land off Church Street – a developer, Ashford Homes, has requested a meeting to discuss potential plans for this site. This meeting will not be a Parish Council meeting. Rather, it will be a community event where all parishioners are invited to attend. The meeting will provide Ashford Homes with the opportunity to outline their ideas, and for villagers to ask questions. Because of Covid restrictions, it will be online via Zoom. The date and time are: Thursday 18th March at 7:30pm. Details of how to join the meeting will be published on the parish council's website and on the Support Group's Facebook page nearer to this date.

Hilperton to Melksham cycle path — after preliminary consultation which showed 80% support for the path, Wiltshire Council has announced that Cabinet is considering taking forward plans for the path. More consultation will follow.

Coltsfoot is now in flower along the towpath of the Kennet and Avon which is a sure sign that Spring cannot be far away. At first glance, coltsfoot looks like a dandelion but its stems are pink, thicker and scaly. It gets its name because the leaves that come after seed has been set are shaped like a colt's hoofprint. It's also known as Tussilage after its Latin name and can be found in many places including road verges, railway sidings, riverbanks and abandoned land. It's popular with herbalists.

Justice Shall Be Done You. Sweet-Scented Tussilage is a brief poem is by Frances Sargent Osgood who was a popular writer in the United States in the early 1800s. She is particularly remembered for her exchange of romantic poems with Edgar Allen Poe.

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Parish Council Meeting

Abridged Minutes From Meeting Held Wednesday 10th February 2021

Present: Councillors P Smith (Vice-Chairman and Acting Chairman for the meeting), V Bodman, M Kasasian, R Oglesby, W Scott, C Wade, R Bruges, S Chown and the Clerk Roger Coleman. Wiltshire Council Cllr. J Seed attended (Part-time). There were no members of the public present.

Wiltshire Council Report: Wiltshire Council, Cllr. J Seed gave a brief report on the following topics: Wiltshire Council Local Development Plan - He arranged and attended a meeting at Wiltshire Council offices with Head of Spatial Planning, Chairman of Semington Parish Council and Cllr. Scott to discuss the Local Plan. Cllr. Seed stated that he would continue to support the local villages. A350 Melksham Bypass Consultation – This initial consultation has ended and the responses and possible routes will now be assessed. He added that further consultations will ensue with the next one likely to be in the late summer. Wiltshire Council Budget FY2021/22 - Wiltshire Council has produced a balanced budget totalling some £412m which will be presented to the full Wiltshire Council on 23rd February for approval. He commented that the proposed increase in Council Tax was 1.99% plus a 3% levy for Social Care. Westbury Bypass – In answer to a question from the Council he commented that the Westbury Bypass project was likely to be implemented but after the construction of the new A350 Melksham Bypass. The intention of the DoT was to progressively improve the heavy goods vehicle route from the M4 motorway to Poole/Southhampton starting from the M4 motorway.

Chairman's Report: The Chairman report – please see page 9 in this magazine.

Wiltshire Council Local Development Plan. The Chairman reported that Cllr. Scott had attended the Wiltshire Council webinar addressing the Melksham and Rural elements of the plan, Cllr. Bodman had attended the webinar addressing the Rural element and that he, Cllr. Smith, had attended the webinar that concentrated on Trowbridge and the Rural elements. The Chairman gave details of the webinars to the Council and explained that Semington and some other local villages, were now in the Trowbridge Housing Market Area (HMA) having been transferred from the Chippenham HMA — a transfer that was implemented with very little overt consultation with the villages involved and, according to Cllr. Scott a proposal that was 'buried' in the plethora of documentation that accompanied the formal Strategic Plan consultation in 2019. Cllr. Smith added that in his view it was a move of HMA designed solely to meet Trowbridge Town Council's housing and expansion ambitions and housing targets.

Cllr. Wade stated that Wiltshire Council should have advised the villages affected directly, through their respective Parish Councils, of this proposed change of HMA and the Council should make their objections to the manner in which this change was

effected known to Wiltshire Council. Cllr. Bruges lamented the fact that despite representations on various issues the Parish Council's view appears usually to be ignored and he questioned whether there was a better way of influencing the views and decisions of Wiltshire Council. The Chairman commented that the Parish Council must strive to change this decision regarding the move of Semington to the Trowbridge HMA.

Councillors expressed the view that the implications of the Draft Local Development Plan, if adopted, could have serious consequences for Semington and that the views of parishioners should also be sought. The Chairman stated that he would convene an Extra Ordinary Parish Council meeting to discuss this Plan with a view to drafting a possible response to the formal Consultation that would be sent to Wiltshire Council. The Chairman stated that the Extra Ordinary Parish Council meeting would be held on 24th February, commencing at 7.30pm. Meanwhile it was agreed that notice of the meeting would be advertised on the Website and in the Newsletter.

Neighbourhood Plans. Cllr. Scott stated he did not consider that the Parish Council should develop a Neighbourhood Plan and that his reasons for this view were expressed in the paper that accompanied the Agenda for this meeting. Cllr. Oglesby also stated his opposition to the development of a plan based on his experience with a nearby Parish Council. He commented that it would involve a huge amount of work, a large expense, a prolonged timescale and the need for the local community to be supportive and fully involved throughout the exercise — the latter would prove impossible to achieve based on his own experience. Initial enthusiasm soon waned. He added that such a plan would quickly become out of date. Cllr. Bodman stated that Neighbourhood Plans can be very useful particularly in defining possible development areas and protecting other areas, such as green spaces, in the villages. She suggested that a scoping exercise be undertaken to help examine the usefulness of such a plan. This was a view supported by Cllr. Bruges.

Cllr. Scott queried whether the absence of such a plan would inhibit or disadvantage Semington. The Chairman commented that a Neighbourhood Plan could be advantageous by helping to control the development of the village but that it was essential that there was community support for its development and implementation. He suggested that Wiltshire Council be consulted. Cllr. Bodman agreed to make enquiries of Wiltshire Council and others who have been contracted to develop such plans and Cllrs. Chown and Bruges agreed to make enquiries of those villages that have already developed such Neighbourhood Plans. Cllrs. Smith, Scott and Bodman agreed to meet with Wiltshire Council officers who have direct experience of such plans.

The Chairman commented that it was evident that more information was required before deciding whether to develop a Neighbourhood Plan for Semington and he invited all parties to research the subject in more detail.

The Council <u>resolved</u> not to make a decision at this time regarding developing a Neighbourhood Plan. Cllr. Oglesby added that if a decision was made to develop such a plan it was essential that it was a project managed by the community with involvement from Parish Councillors and not left to the Parish Council to manage it alone. The Council <u>resolved</u> to become a member of CPRE and to pay the £36 Annual Membership Fee.

Future Village Development. The Council <u>resolved</u> to adopt revised text as a statement of the approach of Semington Parish Council to Village Development and planning applications. This can be viewed on the Parish Council website as well as in the community newsletter circulated in February. The request from Ashford Homes for a meeting with the Parish Council to discuss the possible development of land off Church Street was noted by the Council. The Chairman reiterated the Parish Council's approach to such meetings stating that any such meeting would be held in public with the public also invited to attend. The Clerk stated that the meeting would not be a Parish Council meeting and it should be termed a 'Community Meeting', designed to attract interested parishioners of Semington and widely advertised as such. Councillors agreed that **Thursday 18**th **March** was a suitable date time to be advised on council website..

Environment and Streetscene. Cllr. Bruges proposed that a meeting of this Group be held on Tuesday 16th February at 7.30pm. The other members of the group — Cllrs. Scott and Kasasian - confirmed their attendance. Cllr. Smith stated that the Littlemarsh residents had requested that the Parish Council provides them with three sets of Litter Picking equipment to allow them to undertake litter picking in their immediate area. The Council <u>resolved</u> to provide three sets of equipment not exceeding in total £50.

Transport and Traffic. The Chairman commented that he had sent the missive from a Littlemarsh resident to all councillors and that a number of areas of concern had been listed and these areas related to the 'Gate', speeding traffic and Anti-Social behaviour. Cllr. Smith stated that there was strong support for a cycleway between Hilperton and Melksham via Semington and Wiltshire Council is now taking the project to the next stage.

Finance. Total balance in hand at 10th February 2021 £37,712.90

Date of the next meeting. The date for the Extra Ordinary Parish Council meeting was agreed to be **Wednesday 24**th **February 2021** and that it would be a remote/virtual (Zoom) meeting and would commence at 7.30pm.

The date for the next Ordinary Parish Council meeting was agreed to be **Wednesday 10**th **March 2021 at 7.30pm** via Zoom

Your Wiltshire Councillor News

I write this in the middle of our blast of arctic weather. This weather has brought its own share of problems in addition to those that are sadly suffering due to the pandemic. Frozen pipes and failed boilers will be followed by burst pipes and the difficulty of finding a plumber to fix them. The pain is shared by rural and urban dwellers alike. Farmers have great difficulty in getting water to animals in frozen conditions and villagers will be suffering similar issues. Let us all hope that with the emergence of the daffodils and our national lead in COVID vaccination that we really do have a spring and summer to look forward to.

Planning is something that local government is required to manage, often on behalf of central government. Planning for future housing in the county is also required, not only by central government but also so that we can manage local housing expansion. The Current Housing Plan consultation is underway with comments required by mid-March. This Plan is a particularly difficult one for us locally and it is not one that I feel has been shared well with local villages. With very little consultation, and decisions that were buried in hundreds of pages of reports, the Cabinet of Wiltshire Council adopted recommendations for further consultation by consultants who have little or no local knowledge. We need to inject that local knowledge.

Our area is being expected to take significant numbers of extra houses and the villages of Semington, Steeple Ashton, Keevil, Bulkington and Great Hinton are being arbitrarily moved HMA (Housing Market Area) without any direct reference to Parish Councils or villagers. The evidence for these extra houses is not firm and we can still influence final decisions. I have been meeting with the Cabinet Member for Planning and senior planning officers in order to negotiate a better settlement for our area. This is a major local issue and we all need to get involved if we want to influence the final decision.

So these planning proposals need careful local analysis because it is clear to me that the consideration and local analysis by decision makers could be better. I urge residents to get involved in this planning consultation and contact me if they need help. The consultation on the Local Plan is still open and can be found at wiltshire.gov.uk/planning-policy-local-plan-review-consultation




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Why Doctors Wear Masks continued

Sadly, I did neither. I just ran into the guy, bolt upright. We both hit the deck. I was face down and immediately felt the claret making an exit from my nose faster than Usain Bolt in an Olympic 100m final. I rolled over onto my back and went to pinch the bridge of my nose. It was a good 'un! The bridge of my nose was so far over, I totally missed it. My brother came over and just said, "Oh dear." The game stopped and players from both sides came to see if I was OK. Clearly, I had to go to hospital.

Shirley then did something I wish she hadn't. She walked onto the pitch to help me off, cursing as she came on, "Oh you silly little Billy. What have you done to yourself. You did say you wouldn't get injured" Well, words to that effect. I left the pitch helped by Shirley to members of both teams chanting, "who's a naughty boy." My nose was too much of a mess for the doctors to do anything that day and I had to return the following Thursday to have it straightened. The following Thursday in hospital, I put on one of those flimsy dressing gowns that they make backwards, to save your blushes, as I had nothing else on. I was wheeled into a corridor and noticed the clock. 10:05am. After a couple of minutes, I was wheeled into the operating theatre and the nurse left. All I could see of the anaesthetist was his eyes. He leant forward and in a hushed, falsetto voice said, "You can try counting backwards from 10 but you'll never get anywhere near zero sweety." I panicked desperately trying to remain conscious 10,9,8..... 1,2,3 - what's going on? I was feeling drowsy but now I'm nearly conscious again. This could hurt when they straighten my nose. Next, the nurse wheeled me back out into the corridor. I was confused. I looked at the clock again. It was now 10:15am. I called a passing nurse over and explained that I was waiting to have my nose straightened but the anaesthetic was already wearing off. Its going to hurt! 'It's done.' she calmly said. I protested that it hadn't. 'It has' she said. 'Feel it.'

Cautiously, I reached up to my nose. Yes, it was sore but it was also straight! I had been unconscious and hadn't realised. Hooray!

And then the true panic came back. I had been unconscious in that excuse of a dressing gown with that anaesthetist. All I could see was his eyes. And that is why doctors wear masks......

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Can you help us?

We are lucky here in Semington to live in a very caring, safe environment, but unfortunately we do have instances of inconsiderate behaviour that raise the hackles and make us cross. I wonder then, if you do feel like this on occasions, whether you can help us?

I am sure that many of you have heard of the Neighbourhood Watch Scheme and even been a member of it in the past. - Inviting local residents to join
- Being a point of contact for residents and the local police and other agencies
- Distributing information
- Encouraging residents to report problems and promote being a good neighbour
- Get to know who the vulnerable residents are

We are now in the season of Lent, the period from Ash Wednesday to Easter, when we might stop to take stock of our lives and, if appropriate, our relationship with God. It is common for people of faith or not to "give up something for Lent" – this is often a desire for self-improvement, to lose weight, become healthier or perhaps to make life better for others.

For about a year now we have been living through a pandemic. Covid-19 has affected us all — some more deeply than others. There are also boxes or trolleys in our supermarkets where donations can be left.

So if you can, think about buying one or more extra tin or packet of something when you shop this Lent to make a difference to someone else and you might decide to carry on doing it when Lent has finished, because the need is there all the year. Jesus said that the greatest commandments are to love God and to love our neighbour. Through a simple act of kindness this Lent, we can do both.


I do hope everyone is staying healthy and that those of you that have had the vaccine have been ok with it.


