#### Parish Council Matters

Peter Smith, Chair of the Parish Council

Community Meeting about Newland Homes proposals for 18 additional homes - has now been rearranged for 7.00pm on Wednesday 16<sup>th</sup> March in the Village Hall, with the scheduled Parish Council meeting starting afterwards at 8.00pm. Please come along if you want to ask questions of Newland Homes and to comment on its proposals to add a further 18 homes to the remainder of the St. George's Road site. Be aware that a planning application has now been submitted for this site, but your comments will still count in Wiltshire Council's assessment of the plans.

AND yet more housing developer interest – the Parish Council has been notified of an interest, by Hollins Strategic Land, in developing the field west of Turnpike Close and just north of the A361. This developer is suggesting that it work with the village as part of the neighbourhood planning process. All this is on top of the 24 homes being built south of St. George's Road, and the further 26 homes that have planning permission in the field opposite St. George's Place. Plus we are aware of at least one other landowner interested in developing land in the village.

If you're wondering where the council stands on this, it resolved on 16<sup>th</sup> February that it will not support any further housing development in Semington. That view is, of course, subject to your views on future development in the village which will be framed through the Neighbourhood Planning process. Which brings me to....

....5<sup>th</sup> March, Neighbourhood Planning Consultation — this event, at the Village Hall from 11.00am to 3.00pm, really matters in gathering your views on how we, in this village, want to shape land use over the coming 15 years. Your involvement is critical because, without it, our Semington neighbourhood plan won't be a proper reflection of our collective wishes. Hopefully, you will have all received a printed flyer about this event and explaining its purpose. So, please find a moment to pop in on the 5<sup>th</sup> March and let us know your thoughts. There will be refreshments and activities for children, too!

**Tennis court** – volunteers have been working around the perimeter of the court to cut back growth from the surrounding trees, and to build a weed free barrier around the base to protect the surface. This will be continuing for a few weeks. Any court users wanting to help, please look out for working party dates and times on the village Facebook page.


#### **Nature Notes**

This year, I saw the first celandine in the village towards the end of January. A single flower shining at the base of a stile. It had somehow managed to escape being grubbed up when the area was cleared of so called weeds. There is certainly nothing weedy about a plant that always defies the new year cold to provide cheerful evidence that Spring will soon be with us. Wordsworth wrote three times about the celandine. These are extracts from his:

#### To a Small Celandine.

Pansies, lilies, kingcups, daisies, Let them live upon their praises; Long as there's a sun that sets, Primroses will have their glory; Long as there are violets, They will have a place in story: There's a flower that shall be mine, 'Tis the little Celandine.

Ere a leaf is on a bush, In the time before the thrush Has a thought about her nest, Thou wilt come with half a call, Spreading out thy glossy breast Like a careless Prodigal; Telling tales about the sun, When we've little warmth, or none.





Comfort have thou of thy merit, Kindly, unassuming Spirit!
Careless of thy neighbourhood,
Thou dost show thy pleasant face
On the moor, and in the wood,
In the lane; - there's not a place,
Howsoever mean it be,
But 'tis good enough for thee.

Prophet of delight and mirth, Ill-requited upon earth; Herald of a mighty band, Of a joyous train ensuing, Serving at my heart's command Tasks that are no tasks renewing, I will sing, as doth behove, Hymns in praise of what I love!

#### WILTSHIRE COUNCILLOR NEWS

I am penning my news a little later in the month because for the first time in several years my wife and I have taken a break and been abroad for two weeks to stay with relatives. Not only does this come at an appropriate time in my political life but as an added bonus this was a much appreciated and relaxing stay in a very hot country. Perhaps our stay was made even more welcome by the cold and wet weather which we left behind in England (and flew back into!). However modern communications mean that I have long since given up abandoning messages and e-mails for the length of my absence abroad. A daily half hour or so of clearing e mails means that I can help with all sorts of issues from afar, albeit sitting in the sun or shade. Maybe dealing with local planning applications from 5000 miles away is not everyone's idea of a break but I believe it is only reasonable to continue to give the best service possible to residents as best I can.

One day after leaving a temperature of 37°c I set out in very cold and wet rain to attend the budget meeting of Wiltshire Council in Trowbridge. It was therefore doubly interesting to hear the drums and noise of climate change demonstrators outside the Civic Centre as I am acutely aware of what the differences and extremes of climate on our planet really are. There was much in the news as I returned in the middle of February, including Ukraine, Partygate and energy costs. Having seen the struggle for survival and 'prosperity' in another part of the world it brings into sharp focus many of our first world issues. Here we seek to cope with huge rises in energy costs whilst in many parts of the world electricity supply is often broken and not a constant supply. Our vehicle fuel is comparatively expensive compared to other parts of the world and we need to look carefully at why this is. We even pay 10% more for our fuel that our near European neighbours. My council division is one of the most sparsely populated in Wiltshire and the use of a car is an essential part of life and not a luxury. As a rural resident and elected representative I really do think that it is time that instead of just accepting every rise in fuel we start to look at the possibility of some separation and perhaps a fiscal allowance for those who really need to use their cars from those who choose to use their cars.

Finally, as I write this, the budget of Wiltshire Council has been passed and we look forward to a further year of sound financial management albeit with every increasing tightening of our belt. In the meantime should any resident need to contact me I am always willing to help with local government issues.

#### Parish Council Meeting

Abridged Minutes From Meeting Held Wednesday 16th February 2022

**Present:** Councillors P Smith (Chairman), V Bodman, S Chown, J Hailey, W Scott, C Wade and the Clerk Roger Coleman. Wiltshire Council Cllr. J Seed attended parttime. There were no members of the public present. **Apologies:** Apologies for nonattendance were received and accepted from Cllrs. R Bruges, M Kasasian, S Rimmer.

**Declaration of Interests:** Cllr. Bodman declared an interest in Agenda item 6g 'Rural Housing Need Survey'. There were no other interests declared.

Wiltshire Council Report: The Semington/Hilperton Cycleway: The route for this cycleway has now been agreed by Wiltshire Council and Cllr. Seed was reassured by the Chairman that the Wiltshire Council Highways Engineer had agreed to consult with the Parish Council in respect of the proposed surface for the cycleway and it was important that such consultation included a site meeting. Travellers Sites: Wiltshire Council (Highways and Public Health) are addressing the problem concerning the discharge of sewage at the Greenacres site and legal action is in hand regarding the breach of planning conditions at the Littleton site.

Planning and Development: The Council noted the Draft/Informal proposals for the development of land at/near Hilperton currently under discussion between Wiltshire Council and Lightwood Strategic Ltd and decided that comments from the Parish Council should await the publication of the Draft Local Plan. Cllr. Bodman proposed that the immediate priority is to concentrate on the proposed developments in Semington namely the Newland Homes and Greystoke developments – both of which have planning permission – and the emerging developments by Hollins Strategic Land LLP (at Turnpike Close) and those by Ashford Homes and the latest one from Newland Homes. The Chairman, supported by the councillors, commented that it was important to keep contact with the Hilperton AAG over the Lightwood Strategic Ltd proposals and he thanked Cllr. Bruges for his involvement to date. The Council resolved that Cllr. Bruges had the authority to represent the Parish Council at meetings/discussions relating to this subject.

Cllr. Scott stated that Semington was now the subject of five housing developments – two of which have received planning permission (Newland Homes and Greystoke) – and three further proposals for developments – Hollins Strategic Land Ltd (the Turnpike), Ashford Homes (Church Lane) and Newland Homes (St Georges 'infill'). He argued that this was grossly excessive development for a village the size of Semington and that the proposed number of properties was far too many and were, in most cases, in the wrong location. Also, importantly, the proposed number of properties was in direct conflict with the results of the recently conducted Rural Housing Need Survey.

Following a proposal by Cllr. Scott, the Parish Council <u>resolved</u> that it does not support any further housing developments in Semington but that it would reexamine this resolution following village consultations and the development of the Neighbourhood Plan.

Neighbourhood Plan (NP): The Chairman reported that the fifth meeting of the Neighbourhood Planning Group (NPG) was held on 5<sup>th</sup> February 2022 and that it is progressing well. He added that there is to be a Village Consultation Day on 5<sup>th</sup> March 2022, 11.00am to 3.00pm, for parishioners to express their views and for the priorities and objectives of the Neighbourhood Plan to be discussed and identified. He added that a 'flyer' had been sent to all households advertising this event. The Clerk commented that a grant of £1580 towards the cost of developing a Neighbourhood Plan had been received.

Finance: Final Balance as at 16th February 2022 is £55,209.58

**Recreation and Wellbeing:** Cllr. Wade reported that he is continuing to progress the acquisition of allotment plots and that Mike Kurton has been identified as the main point of contact. Cllr. Chown reported that the creation of a Semington Civil Parish Neighbourhood Watch Scheme is progressing well and some volunteers have come forward. She stated that she intended to place an article in the Village Newsletter and on social media to attract more volunteers. She stated that new Neighbourhood Watch signs are around £30 each and the Council <u>resolved</u> that a maximum of £300 be allocated to the purchase of the signs. She added that she was intending to hold a Village Meeting in April to advertise the Neighbourhood Watch Scheme.

**Community and Communication:** Cllr. Bodman reported that arrangements for celebrating H.M. The Queen's Platinum Jubilee were progressing well and that a recent meeting on the subject attracted ten parishioners. She added that there were a number of matters that needed addressing such as insurance cover, a road closure – probably from Pound Lane to the Canal Bridge – details of a Soap Box Derby and many others. Noting her request for possible expenditure, the Council **resolved** to allocate £1000 to this project and councillors commented that this project represented a community project and as such any expenditure should be from the recently received CIL contribution.

#### Melksham Foodbank -

Thank you so much for all your donations to the Melksham Foodbank, whether you left them in the designated trolleys or boxes in Melksham supermarkets or doctors' surgeries, or in the porch of St George's Church or at the Somerset Arms. The latter are collected at around 6pm every Wednesday. Everything you have given has gone to help the most needy and vulnerable people.

To give you an idea of how much that need has increased, I have some statistics supplied to me by the Foodbank:

- In 2019 they gave out 639 bags of food and other items to single people and 1114 to families, making a total of 1753.
- In 2020 the amount given out to families had doubled from the year before, with 2268 bags going to families and 880 to single people, making 3148, in all. But in both 2019 and 2020 bags of items were given specifically to children, however the number was not recorded.
- In 2021 969 bags went to single people and 2811 to families, making a total of 3780. However, last year the children's bags were counted and there were 2159 of them, which makes a grand total of 5939 in 2021.

This year, with the cost of living increases and the steep rise in energy bills to come, it seems likely that the tragic need for Foodbanks will only increase. Your donations are absolutely vital to keep meeting this need. The Foodbank simply couldn't function with people like you, who are making a real difference.

If you need the up to date list of items that they are particularly short of, then that is put on the village Facebook page each week, or ring me on 01380 870137. Generally, they welcome any tinned or packet item with a long best before date, but no fresh items or fruit or veg, apart from tinned. Toilet rolls are also welcomed. Many thanks, Julia

#### Extracts From The Last Methodist Service at St George's

The Compton Census of 1676 showed Semington as having 207 conformists (Church of England) and 2 non-conformists. One hundred and thirty years on in 1797, houses were licensed in Semington for Methodist meetings. Records show that in 1829, Semington Methodists had 27 members and an average congregation of 80, though presumably not in the same house!

The sanctioning of a chapel building was granted in 1884, and a chapel was built with that year's date on. Mr Henry Stockwell, grocer and postmaster, was instrumental in the chapel's construction and known throughout the area for his devotion to the cause. He was clerk to the Parish Council for 39 years and chairman of the village hall construction committee. His involvement with Methodism went far beyond Semington being a Trustee of the Trowbridge & Bradford Methodist Circuit, Chapel Steward, Sunday School Superintendent, and organist. In 1912 the Duke of Somerset gave land for a Sunday School to be built attached to the chapel for its 80 scholars! Outings arranged by the Methodists by horse and trap and later charabanc were always eagerly awaited and much enjoyed by many in Semington.

During the 1960's Anglican and Methodist co-operation was being discussed and shared services in both Church and Chapel cemented excellent ecumenical relations. Some 20 years later the Wesleyan Chapel was sold and in 1981 St. George's Anglican PCC combined with Semington Methodist Church Council to allow for joint use of St. George's Church for both Anglican and Methodist services.

Joyous 10th and 20th Church Sharing Anniversary Services were held in 1991 and 2001. The Bristol Methodist District Chairs, Rev Ian White and Rev Ward Jones, preached at these packed Church services. The congregations rejoiced in God's love in enabling Free Church witness and service. The work of God, undergirded by prayer, has achieved much mission and outreach as we proclaim His Glory in a non-labelling denominational environment.

So after 225 years of licensed Methodism in Semington, with the last 40 being enriching, enthusiastic Church sharing, the time now seems right to draw to a close Methodist Services in Semington. Therefore, it is with mixed emotions that we come to the end of an era, but as Christians in Semington, we believe as in the words of an Anglican Minister, Rev. John Wesley, nearing his death on the 2 March 1791 'The best of all is, God is with us'.

We are grateful for the Area's Ministers and local preachers who have led worship in Semington over 2 and a quarter centuries, and as Rev Ward Jones preached in our final service, we rejoice in this change of direction. The Anglican Rector, Rev. John Rees, continues to be thanked for his invitation to allow for non-conformist Free Church service style to be enabled quarterly. So let us praise the Lord for all that has been, and all that is to come.

#### Thought from the Rectory

For Christians Lent is a time of reflection as we prepare for Easter, the great festival of the Church when the death and resurrection of Jesus is remembered. We begin this time of reflection on Ash Wednesday (2<sup>nd</sup> March) and it continues until Easter Day. Our Churches are going to offer a number of options for reflection and discussion, some in person and others via Zoom. You would be welcome to join us – details can be found on our website (see back page for details), though do contact me to find out more. One theme which I am looking forward to, though I think it will be challenging, involves an exploration of justice.

All of us, from an early age, can think of times when we have cried out "its not fair!" I have vivid memories of being sent to my bedroom as a punishment for something I hadn't done. I can't remember my supposed misdemeanour of over 50 years ago; but I can remember being both furiously angry and deeply hurt! More recently, I remember being cross at receiving a parking ticket for parking on a double yellow line which was obscured by snow.

These of course are minor injustices. The Archbishop of Canterbury, in his forward to "Embracing Justice", the book by Isabelle Hamley we will use to explore the theme of justice, points out that in recent years cries for justice in much more important areas such as the Black Lives Matter campaign have attracted media attention. Coronavirus has made some of the injustices in society more evident. In this country death rates have been higher in areas of deprivation, but I am so aware that (having just had the virus), my symptoms, having had three vaccinations, were moderate, and yet there are many parts of the world where most people are still waiting for protection.

In many of these areas it is easier to recognise the problems than to identify, let alone implement, solutions. The Bible makes it abundantly clear that God, creator of the world and everyone and everything in it calls us to live justly. For example, the prophet Isaiah called his hearers to "Maintain justice and do what is right" (Isaiah 56:1). Most tellingly, it is through the death of Jesus on the cross after a sham trial, that God fully reveals his love for every one of us. Through Jesus God forgives our errors, sets us free to start again, and loves us as his adopted children.

We are called to show love to all. I think that in our village our care and passion for justice is expressed most fully in the wonderful contributions to Melksham foodbank, week by week, through the year.

Lent gives us an opportunity to reflect on whether there is more we can do.


