### Parish Council Matters

Peter Smith - Chair of the Parish Council

Community Development Fund — the Parish Council has funding available to support community developments that benefit the village. To help it decide how to allocate this money, the council has set up a working group to communicate with villagers and advise it on how to proceed with what we're calling Community Development Funding. As mentioned in my report last month, this working group is to be made up of 3 parish councillors and two volunteers from within the village. If you'd like to be one of those volunteers, please let me know by calling **01380 870888**.

**Vacancy for Parish Councillor** – the Parish Council wants to co-opt a parishioner to fill a vacancy on the council. There's always lots going on which affects us as a community, and plenty of scope for you to contribute to preserving what we love within, and making improvements to, our village. The Byway – I'm afraid there is still no news of the safety audit promised by Wiltshire Council. I know quite a few of you have written to the council. For what it's worth, my own experiences either walking or cycling along this byway have so far been OK: courteous and careful behaviour from everyone, including a couple of very respectful motorists. Courteous and careful road manners are, of course, the only way this newly surfaced road can work as a multi use route for all of us, whether in a vehicle, on a horse, riding a bicycle or motorcycle, or on foot.

Parish Steward – each month, we get a visit of 1.5 days from the parish steward employed by Wiltshire Council to serve a number villages in the area. The parish steward helps to maintain the highways and pavements in our village. A new steward, Emma, was appointed to our area about 4 months ago. On her last visit in early October, she and her colleagues did a great job of sweeping the gutters along High Street, St.George's Road and other streets, as well as digging out and clearing the blocked storm drains near Church Street. If you have any highway/pavement jobs that you think need addressing on a future visit, please let me know on the above phone number, or email the Parish Clerk, also above.

## News From Your Wiltshire Councillor

I write a monthly contribution for the Parish magazines of all villages which I represent on Wiltshire Council. These are Broughton Gifford, Steeple Ashton, Keevil, Great Hinton and Semington and also the message goes out via Melksham Without Parish Council to the residents of Berryfield. I write as your elected Councillor to update you on headline Wiltshire Council matters and update on my involvment in village issues. I undertake to make my articles non political in their content. I would like to say an ongoing thanks to the Editorial Committee of the Parish Magazine for allowing me to contribute to the magazine.

There are several Wiltshire Council issues which are being taken forward by the Council. These include taking a lead on climate change, further funding and support for victims of domestic abuse and a commitment to more Parish Stewards for local highways and footpath improvements. I am often involved in several local village issues at the same time and these include planning applications, footpath concerns and trying to get help for local projects.

One very topical issue is how we help those struggling in the current financial crisis. Country dwellers are often very independent and very proud people. Even the most pressed are unlikely to publicise their lack of heating in winter. If we happen to notice someone who may be struggling, perhaps an invitation for a cup of tea and perhaps some cake in a warm house may really help. Alongside this personal touch Wiltshire Council is leading on a warm space initiative to encourage communities to offer warm spaces and sustenance to residents. Let's hope we can all do our bit for those that need a bit of help over the winter.

Finally I am always available to help residents with their local government issues. The easiest way to contact me is by email but I can also be contacted by phone. I try to attend most meetings of the Parish Council so it may be possible to arrange a meeting in person either to coincide with a Parish Council meeting or a personal meeting to suit residents.

## **Abridged Minutes from Parish Council Meeting**

Meeting held Wednesday 19th October 2022

**Present.** Councillors P Smith (Chairman), V. Bodman, R Bruges, S Chown, J Hailey, W. Scott and the Clerk, Roger Coleman.

There were two members of the public present initially.

**Apologies.** Apologies for non-attendance were received and accepted from Cllrs. C Wade and M. Kasasian and apologies were received from Wiltshire Council Cllr. J Seed.

**Wiltshire Council Report.** In the absence of Cllr. Seed no report by Cllr. Seed was given. The Chairman reported that Cllr. Seed had informed him that he would make enquiries of Wiltshire Council relating to the Greenacres travellers' site.

Cllrs. Bodman and Scott proposed that Cllr. Seed should also enquire into the extent to which Wiltshire Council had met the rural housing needs for affordable homes for local people in the allocation of houses at the Newland Homes development.

**Chairman's Report.** The Chairman, on behalf of the Council, expressed regret at learning of the resignation of Cllr. Bodman. He thanked Cllr. Bodman for her service as a councillor and complimented her for bringing a fresh and very welcome perspective to the Council during her time as councillor. He wished her well for the future. These sentiments were echoed by all those present.

**Planning and Development.** There were no planning applications received after 13<sup>th</sup> October 2022. Cllr. Scott stated that following his enquiries with Wiltshire Council he had learned that planning application 19/02147/OUT (26 Residential Dwellings, Land North of St Georges Road) had not progressed further than the 'Outline Permission' stage. He also commented that a statement from the Government today indicated that it was intending to abandon the 'top down' approach to determining local housing number requirements. The Council noted the concerns expressed by parishioners about the number of static homes located at the Greenacres site and possible safety concern regarding the storage of gas cylinders. The Chairman stated that he would write to Cllr. Seed with these concerns.

**Neighbourhood Plan.** The Chairman reported that the process of developing a Neighbourhood Plan had provided a wealth of useful and informative data about the village and the aspirations of its inhabitants. He added that the following steps had now been taken:

- A consultant had been appointed to undertake a Landscape Assessment. A report is expected by the end of November.
- Councillors (Cllrs. Scott, Bodman) had, with consultants from AECOM, examined the
  fourteen sites identified as SHLAA sites by Wiltshire Council regarding their suitability
  for development. An additional site the (old) Motel Field, now owned by the Order of
  St Johns, was also examined.
- A Climate Change Survey has been undertaken and some fifty-five responses obtained.
- A list of businesses within the Civil Parish of Semington has been compiled the aim is
  to seek views on how the Neighbourhood Development Plan might best support those
  businesses regarding possible development of those businesses.

The Chairman commented that it is intended also to undertake a 'Heritage Survey' of parish features that do not qualify for statutory designation (e.g. Listed Building status).

#### Finance. Total balance in hand as at 19th October 2022 - £79,581.67

Cllr. Scott explained that he would send an updated report on the Community Development Fund Working Group for comment to councillors and the Clerk which would also contain proposals for establishing the group and for seeking and assessing possible community projects. He added that he envisaged that the group would comprise three councillors and two parishioners but the approval of any project would be subject to approval by the Parish Council. Cllr. Scott commented that some possible projects are likely to emerge from the development of the Neighbourhood Plan development. The Clerk confirmed that he would scrutinize any proposed projects to ensure that they met any constraints imposed by the Community Infrastructure Levey and LGA1972 – especially s137 if applicable.

The Council resolved to approve a budget of £275 for the purchase of the village Christmas tree. The Council resolved to make a donation of £600 to St George's PCC (Village Newsletter & Grass Cutting).

**Environment and Streetscene.** Rights of Way: The Council noted the continuing safety concerns regarding Paths SEMI9A/10 and HILP22/10 as a 'cycleway' and that members of the public had expressed their concerns during the public participation prior to the Parish Council meeting. The Council reaffirmed that it was awaiting the results of the safety audit to be undertaken by Wiltshire Council and that would determine whether additional safety measures were necessary. Councillors commented that gates on Path SEMI8/10 were regularly closed when there was no livestock to protect and in the absence of any livestock, there should be unfettered access along that path. Cllr. Scott stated that he would make enquiries. Cllr. Scott reported that he had recently attended a meeting of the Wilts and Berks Canal Liaison Group which included representatives from Wiltshire Council. He added that Wiltshire Council was supportive of the canal project but would not support additional house building in the area to provide the funding for it. Cllr. Hailey expressed her thanks, endorsed by other councillors, to the Parish Steward for cleaning the gutters and drains in the High Street. The Chairman stated that he would contact the Parish Steward to pass on these thanks. The Chairman noted that there were a number of tasks needing to be addressed such as a litter pick, planting bulbs, a leaf sweep and he stated that he would send the list to councillors for their views.

**Other Matters.** In the absence of Cllr. Wade, agreement on the design/type of the new Parish Council Noticeboard/s was deferred until the next meeting. The decision on the number and species of trees to be purchased for the Queen's Canopy project was pending final consent from Wiltshire Council regarding the various proposed locations.

Recreation and Wellbeing. The Council noted that the defective Ludus Spinning Top had now been removed by Wiltshire Council and the ground reinstated. The Council acknowledged the reply from Wiltshire Council regarding a possible asset transfer and the contractual difficulties relating to this particular site. The Council discussed a number of possible arrangements for the Parish Council to be involved in the management of the Wessex Close Play Area and it was agreed to present these proposals to Wiltshire Council for comment. The Chairman agreed to draft a suitable note for the Clerk to send to Wiltshire Council. There was nothing further reported in respect of whether the future management of the Play Area will be undertaken by a Community Group.

Date of the next meeting. Wednesday 16th November 2022 7.30pm.

## Village Hall Defibrillator

Understandably there was a concern that in the event of the kit being needed for another emergency no one would know where it was!

In order to not over complicate a process if this were to happen again please could whoever needs to take the kit somewhere leave a note on the case advising where it has been taken to! Simples!



**Over half** of residents thought this road **did not** warrant destruction of the landscape and another third were unsure.



## Thought From Joy - Associate Priest In Canalside

November is always a time of remembering and remembrance, whether it is remembering the actions of a certain Guy Fawkes or more importantly the lives of those we have loved who have died and those who gave their lives during times of conflict.

November always begins with the twin days of remembering All Saints and All Souls. All Saints on 1st November, is when we think of all those who have been made saints by the church. In former years this day was known as All Hallows, and the evening before as All Hallows Eve, which eventually became known by most people as Halloween. Then on All Souls Day, 2nd November we remember those we have loved who have died as we traditionally pray for their souls to be at peace with God. Each year on the Sunday closest to All Souls Day, we hold an 'In Loving Memory' service in St. Michael's in Hilperton, where the names of those who have died are remembered and those who are mourning their loss are invited to light a candle in their memory. This year's 'In Loving Memory' Service will be on 30th October at 3.00pm in St. Michael's Church, Hilperton.

The key act of remembrance in our villages though is around Remembrance Day. Every year I am astonished at how many people choose to turn out, whatever the weather, to honour those who gave their lives in the service of our country, and to pray for future peace. Praying for peace is an important part of our Remembrance commemorations especially this year when the peace of the world, especially the peace of Europe has been threatened more than ever. Some people choose to wear a white poppy either alongside their red poppy, or instead of a red poppy. Both the red poppy and the white poppy are worn in the hope of a peaceful future, and whereas the red poppy commemorates the vital work of the armed forces, and the casualties suffered by them, the white poppy is worn to remember all casualties of war, especially the innocent men, women and children who become unwitting victims of conflict.

I cannot think of any in our villages who do not long for peace in the world, and in our services of Remembrance, we remember the hope that God gives us for peace and reconciliation. Hope and peace that comes from Jesus' death and resurrection For Jesus died in our place, in the place of every person on earth, including all those alive now, all who have died and all who are yet to live, so that we might know that 'peace which passes all understanding' the peace that only God can give us.

Whatever colour poppy you choose to wear this year, or even if you choose not to wear a poppy at all, I am sure we all long for that peace.
