Semington Weather 2022..... ...was very dry - then very wet. An interesting fact about last year's weather is that we had more rain in the final 3 months than we had in the first 9! There were many periods with little rain until the end of September, with January, April and July being particularly dry. Then the October - December deluge meant that the annual rainfall was 26.2" (666mm), about 13% below average.

You will have heard reports of 2022 average temperatures being the hottest ever recorded. Well, I have been recording weather for over 40 years in Semington, and yes, 2022 was the highest. The maximum was 36°C on 18<sup>th</sup> and 19<sup>th</sup> July. There was also a week in August when it reached over 30°C on 7 consecutive days. The coldest part of the year was in December where I recorded -9°C on the 16<sup>th</sup> before... the rain returned.

#### This Month I've Had A Bit of A Clear Out

I don't know if I told you but once the new community campus opened in Melksham I joined the library. Not only did it bring back great memories of walking across Chaddesden park with my Mum, Sisters and Patch the dog every Monday evening to exchange our library books for new ones, it has also challenged me to try new authors.

I recently read a wonderful book called 'The Museum of Ordinary People' by Mike Gayle and the central premise was where does everything that has huge sentimental value, but no purpose, go when you can no longer house it at home yet it breaks your heart to take it to the tip? It made me reflect that whilst my sisters and I did a great job of clearing Mum and Dad's home of 57 years I still had things that I simply could not part with and how good would a museum for ordinary people with ordinary things be?

So galvanised after reading the book I revisited all the things I hadn't been able to get rid off originally. As I went through everything that had literally been plonked in the corner I realised I was on another voyage of discovery, I had things that I didn't even know I had! I discovered my Nan Roe's original birth certificate from 1912, along with my Dad's birth certificate from 1937, I have both of my grandparents' and my parents' marriage certificates. I also discovered my Mum did her grade exams in piano – I never knew, ever, like ever, that my Mum could play the piano. I mean how can it be that you get to 55 and three quarters without knowing this?

There were beautiful and emotional surprises too. My Grandad, stationed in Burma during the war, sent my Mum her first Christmas card in 1944 (army issue airmail) and here it is now with me 78 years later. If it hadn't been for the concept of 'The Museum Of Ordinary People' I would never had gone looking again at the stuff in the corner, but oh my goodness what a lovely book of memories I have been able to put together for me and my sisters.

Did everything make the cut? No sadly my moth-eaten red and white beanie hat (knitted by my dear old Mum because at the time I was a Liverpool supporter – don't ask I have no idea why either) went the distance, but the bashed-up lidless biscuit tin my Mum used to keep all of her paperwork in, that's still here – well where else could this ordinary person put the Christening robe that she and her sisters wore? Ordinary things with extraordinary memories.

#### **Parish Council Matters**

Peter Smith, Chair of the Parish Council

Here's wishing .....all in the village a very happy new year. As the summary below shows, there's lots happening in the Parish which currently includes: developers wanting to build where they shouldn't, a play area in decline, and a byway/cycleway which needs some attention to make it safer for all. We need as a community to be very active to get the outcomes we want. Your help, whether writing a letter to Wiltshire Council or volunteering to join a community group, really does make a difference. Some of what follows really could do with your help and input.

Land North of St. George's Road – the Parish Council, at its January meeting, resolved to object to this development. It's reasons for so doing are reproduced in the Parish Council minutes elsewhere in this magazine. Please read these reasons and, if you haven't written to Wiltshire Council with your views yet, please do so as soon as possible. Every comment received by Wiltshire Council counts and will be taken into account even beyond the published deadline of 31st January....so keep sending up until the end of February.

**The Byway** – the Parish Council hasn't yet had sight of the safety audit (of the newly surfaced byway) which was commissioned by Wiltshire Council. We are told that it is due "shortly". We hope to have news for the March magazine.

Wessex Close Play Area – we really, really need some help, perhaps from parents or grandparents with children who use the play area, to join with the two parishioners already doing their best to maintain and improve the play area facilities. There is a separate item in this magazine from ClIr. Siobhan Chown (see page 16) about where we are and what needs to happen. It explains that we can save the play area from terminal decline, and that there is money available to improve it...BUT we do need volunteers for a "Friends of Wessex Close Play Area" group to make great possibilities become reality. Please read Siobhan's message and, hopefully, feel enthused to join the team.

**New Councillor** – the Parish Council has co-opted Cllr. Catherine McGarvey onto the team, which is great. There are now 8 councillors but we remain one vacancy shy of the 9 we need. We are a very friendly and welcoming bunch and, though the work is important in benefitting this village, we as a group try to make it fun and enjoyable. #### **Happy Revolutionary New Year**

In October 1793, the French Revolution replaced the old Gregorian calendar with a new secular, republican one. The republican new year started with the autumnal equinox, with months getting new names based on the seasons. Autumn month names were derived from wine, mist and frost; winter from snow, rain and wind; spring from germination, flowers and meadows; and summer from harvest, summer heat and fruit. And each day was named after a seed, tree, flower, fruit, animal, or tool. The names were (starting from January):

Pluviôse [month of rain] – Ventôse [month of wind] – Germinal [month of sprouting buds]

Floréal [month of flowering] – Prairial [month of meadows] – Messidor [month of harvest]

Thermidor [month of warmth] – Fructidor [month of fruits] – Vendémiaire [month of vintage]

Brumiaire [month of fog] – Frimaire [month of wintry weather] – Nivôse [month of snow]

A contemporary English wit, unimpressed with these names, suggested that they should really have been:

Slippy, Drippy, Nippy – Showery, Flowery, Bowery – Hoppy, Croppy, Poppy and – Wheezy, Sneezy, Freezy.

But the French idea persists in the Czech Republic where the names of the months roughly translate as:

Frozen month – Ice melting month – Animal pregnant month Oak acorn month – Flowering month – Red month Even redder month – Sickle month – Blazing colours month Deer rutting month – Leaf fall month – Pig fattening month.

You have to wonder about the effect of all of this. For example, is biodiversity more alive and well in the Czech Republic than it is here? Given how poor it is here, that's a pretty low hurdle.

#### **News From Your Wiltshire Councillor**

Early 2023 has seen plenty of issues and community concerns arise in Melksham Without West and Rural and all are relevant to the village.

There are ongoing planning concerns and particularly with Wiltshire Council being currently unable to defend speculative local planning applications because the Council cannot demonstrate a five year housing land supply to the Planning Inspectorate. There is also continuing local concern at the reallocation, without any meaningful consultation, of our area into the Trowbridge Housing Market Area with the accompanying threat of Trowbridge housing developments expanding across Hagg Hill. I have raised this issue with the Leader of Wiltshire Council and continue to raise it with the relevant Cabinet Member.

I recently held a joint surgery in Semington with Rt Hon Michelle Donelan MP and most of the issues raised were about planning and particularly unwanted housing development in Semington. Michelle was really helpful and it was useful to have residents raising these concerns direct to her. Michelle is writing to her Cabinet colleague, Michael Gove, asking for action to deal with this issue and we are hopeful of effective legislation this year. If you have concerns about this or any other national policy issue it really helps to write to your MP and either ask for support or thank them for continued and committed support.

Winter months are a time of inclement weather together with resulting effects of flooding and icy roads often leading to carriageway damage. I try to be active in support of villages which suffer from these issues as soon as I know about them. Last month I was able to help with flood water washing away a significant part of the carriageway on Common Hill, Steeple Ashton. As the local Wiltshire Councillor I visited and assessed the problem and in the first 24 hours liaised with the Senior Drainage Engineer, the Area Highways Manager, the Parish Council Chair, out of hours Highways contacts and the poor motorist involved in an accident on the icy road. I also posted updates on village social media. All the Wiltshire Council officers were really helpful and quickly swung into action. Whilst the final repair may take time this important road was made as safe as it could be and remains safe to use.

#### **Abridged Minutes from Parish Council Meeting**

Meeting held Wednesday 18th January 2023

**Present.** Councillors P Smith (Chairman), R Bruges, S Chown, J Hailey, M. Kasasian, W Scott, C. Wade and the Clerk, Roger Coleman. Wiltshire Council, Cllr. J Seed attended and gave his report prior to the meeting. There were three members of the public present initially.

**Co-option of a New Member.** The Council <u>resolved</u> to co-opt Catherine McGarvey.

Community and Communication. The Chairman invited Paul Chown to present a report on the current management and status of the Parish Council website and to identify existing problems with it. Mr Chown gave a detailed and comprehensive report of the current website and, its existing problems and he identified a number of key issues that needed to be addressed to ensure that it operated in the manner required by the Parish Council. The Parish Council endorsed his report and accepted his offer to develop and to propose acceptable solutions to enable the website, and associated email, to operate satisfactorily. Cllr. Chown stated that the initiative by Steeple Ashton Parish Council to improve the BT Open Reach internet connection speeds was in progress but a formal response was awaited from BT Open Reach.

**Recreation and Wellbeing.** Cllr. Wade explained that the work is continuing to identify a possible 'allotment management structure'. He added that there were elements of the s106 Agreement between Wiltshire Council and Newland Homes that needed careful examination, including the legal status of the transferred land and proposed maintenance of the parking spaces, and that he would support legal advice being sought. The Parish Council **resolved** to seek legal advice and the Clerk was asked to make the necessary approaches to Forrester, Sylvester & Mackett (Solicitors).

**Environment and Streetscene.** The Parish Council wished its thanks to be recorded that the gates on Bridleway SEMI8/10 are being kept open by the landowner. Cllr Wade reported that two designs of Noticeboards have been identified as possible candidates for replacing the existing obsolescent Village Hall noticeboards one type costing £356; the other £425 – the latter also including the header and lettering. On a related matter, the Council **resolved** not to accept the offer of sponsorship for the Noticeboards from a local firm.

**Planning and Development** The Council examined the following new planning application: PL/2022/09397 Outline permission Land south of Pound Lane, Semington, BA14 GJP. Residential development of up to 30 dwellings (of which 30% will be affordable) with associated car parking, access, internal roads, public open space, landscaping, drainage and other associated infrastructure. The Parish Council <u>resolved</u> to send the following comments (shown in italics) to Wiltshire Council in respect of Planning application PL/2022/09397:

#### The Parish Council (PC) opposes this application for the following the following reasons:

1. Core Policy 1 of the Wiltshire Core Strategy sets out the Settlement Strategy for the County, and in doing so identifies four tiers of settlement—Principal Settlement, Market Town, Local Service Centre, and Large and Small Village. Within the Settlement Strategy Semington is defined as a Large Village. As such it has a defined boundary beyond which is countryside. Thus, the application site lies beyond the limits of development of Semington in the countryside.

- 2. Core Policy 2 of the Wiltshire Core Strategy sets out the Delivery Strategy. It identifies the scale of growth appropriate within each settlement tier. The policy states that within the limits of development of those settlements with defined limits there is a presumption in favour of sustainable development; but, outside the defined limits that is, in the countryside other than in circumstances permitted by other policies of the Plan, development will not be allowed. The policy further states that the limits of development may only be altered through identification of sites for development through subsequent Site Allocations Development Plan Documents and Neighbourhood Plans. The application site is not identified for development in a Development Plan Document. Neither has it been put forward for development through Semington's emerging Neighbourhood Plan as the landowner / developer ignored the 'call for sites' invitation to do so.
- 3. Core Policy 12 of the Wiltshire Core Strategy sets out the Spatial Strategy for the Melksham Community Area in which Semington lies. It states that development in the Melksham Community Area should be in accordance with the Settlement Strategy set out in Core Policy 1.
- 4. Semington does not need any more market houses or affordable ones at this time, as evidenced by the 2022 Housing Needs Survey. Currently, planning permission already exists for 51 new properties (19 affordable / 32 market) in the village. Any additional development proposed should be taking place in market towns where there are appropriate facilities, and sustainable development is possible.
- 5. The Parish Council (PC) has not been consulted by the developer prior to the application thereby denying the community any opportunity for comment. This was the case with the previous applications to build 20 and 26 houses in the southern part of the field. The developer has declined to respond to overtures from the PC about development in this field and has simply no idea about any preferences the local community might have about any aspect of the development.
- 6. We also note the comments from Urban Design on this application, namely that the applicant did not positively engage early on with Wiltshire Council "in regard to the design quality of their Outline scheme, as expected by NPPF 132". The Urban Design comment concludes: "I cannot support this application and there is grounds within NPPF 134 to refuse it". We agree.
- 7. No attempt has been made to apply for full planning permission for either of the two outline permissions (20 houses / 26 houses) that already exist for this field.
- 8. Bats and owls feed along the hedgerows that border this quiet piece of land but they will not be doing this if the building takes place. Given these losses, it is hard to see how the necessary 10% biodiversity gain that will be needed from November 2023 under the Environment Act 2021 will be possible.
- 9. The development of this land will further compromise the setting of the culturally significant St George's Court and Kennet and Avon canal.
- 10. Pound Lane cannot safely take any more traffic because of existing traffic use, congestion and routine parking.
- 11. The density of housing proposed is greater than in the permission granted in the southern part of the field and also in the adjacent housing on Pound Lane. This flies in the face of the need to create a soft settlement edge which naturally feathers into surrounding rural landscape to the west (a point echoed in the Urban Design comment), and towards the nationally important Kennet and Avon canal. What is proposed will be very visible from a distance.

Finance. Total Balance as at 18th January 2023 £72,141.98

#### Wessex Close Play Area Update

As many of you will be aware, the children's play area in Wessex Close has been in need of some TLC for a few years now. It is currently managed by Wiltshire Council but sadly they will not invest or install any new equipment so when things break they are simply removed. It will therefore not be very long before all the equipment has been removed and the play area is devoid of anything for the children play on and enjoy.

The Parish Council values this asset for our young people and we have recently been investigating the possibility of taking over responsibility of the play area from Wiltshire Council. In principle this is possible, BUT we cannot do it alone! We will need a team of willing volunteers from the village who can help us to inspect, maintain the equipment and it's surrounds, and develop the area to ensure it remains a village asset for many years to come. All activities will be overseen by a member of the Parish Council, training given (where necessary) and any expenses will be reimbursed

The bottom line is that sadly, unless we have some volunteers come forward to help us, then the play area will very soon disappear. I have faith though that the wonderful residents of Semington will come forward to help us and whilst we have had great support from a couple of residents in the past, it is a job for a team not just a couple of people. #### Wiltshire Air Ambulance 2022 – Review

The year 2022 proved to be another busy one for Wiltshire Air Ambulance's aircrew, who undertook 1,061 missions across Wiltshire, Bath and surrounding areas. The charity's helicopter was used for 670 (63%) of the missions, with the remaining 391 incidents attended by critical care cars. A total of 263 patients were transferred to local hospitals (up from 237 in 2021), the majority of which to Royal United Hospital, Bath (84), Southmead Hospital, Bristol (63) and Great Western Hospital, Swindon (44).

Wiltshire Air Ambulance's director of income generation and communications Barbara Gray said: "We have a very dedicated aircrew – consisting of pilots, critical care paramedics and doctors – who respond to emergencies, on average, three times a day, 365 days a year. "We know it is a really difficult time for the country right now, with fuel and energy bills rising, along with inflation, contributing to this current cost of living crisis. However, we remain ever grateful to our amazing donors and local businesses who continue to support us and help raise the £4 million it costs each year to keep our air ambulance flying and saving lives."

The largest number of call outs were to cardiac emergencies – 351, which equates to a third of all missions and a rise from 306 in 2021. There were 174 road traffic collisions attended, plus 74 medical collapses, 51 sporting incidents and 44 assaults. A total of 139 incidents involved children, while 31% of all missions (329) took place at night. The largest number of incidents Wiltshire Air Ambulance responded to were in the Swindon area – 173. The charity attended 83 missions in Bath and 69 in the city of Salisbury.

The aircrew were also tasked to incidents outside of its operational patch, including in counties such as Berkshire, Bristol, Dorset, Gloucestershire, Hampshire, Oxfordshire and Somerset. In total, 22% of incidents were outside of Wiltshire and Bath (down from 23.5% in 2021).

Wiltshire Air Ambulance is a charity and receives no regular direct funding from the Government or National Lottery grants. Each year the charity needs to raise £4 million to continue flying and saving lives.vFor more information about Wiltshire Air Ambulance, go to www.wiltshireairambulance.co.uk

#### Michelle Donelan MP - Chippenham Ward

It was lovely to see so many of you from the village at my recent residents' advice surgery at Semington Village Hall with Cllr Seed earlier this month. It was an absolutely packed morning and we discussed a whole range of topics, from planning, to traffic, to securing investment for the area and our services. I picked up a range of casework to help local residents and I will be taking the issues raised up with the Ministers responsible. I know that planning in particular is something which the village is concerned about, especially speculative development and the speed at which Semington has grown. I have certainly raised these concerns with Housing Secretaries over the years, including a successful campaign to lower the number of new builds allocated to Wiltshire.

The Government's Levelling-up and Regeneration Bill which I have supported through Parliament will ensure that where homes are being built, they are in the right places, and with the right infrastructure to support the areas nearby. Levelling Up Secretary Michael Gove has also changed the rules on the five-year land supply, meaning that Councils with up-to-date local plans will no longer need to demonstrate a five-year supply of housing sites. This will make a real difference for reducing the number of speculative planning applications submitted by developers, which are not included in local plans yet are approved.

The Bill will also give local people a much greater voice throughout the process, something which I am very supportive of. I know that ClIr Seed is on the case too and I will be working with him and Nick Bottrell at Wiltshire Council to ensure that local people have access to affordable housing, and that our communities do not get overwhelmed with new housing. I understand you may still have some concerns or thoughts so please do contact me and with your comments and ideas, and I will meet with Michael Gove to share them with him. If you weren't able to make the surgery but would like to speak to me or if I can help in any other way, please don't hesitate to get in touch.

Elsewhere, on **Thursday 16<sup>th</sup> February** I am running a Cost of Living and Eligibility Check Drop In Session at my office in Chippenham from 10.00am. From Pension Credit to Winter Fuel Allowance, there are a number of schemes which can help provide support during what I know are difficult times, but I realise it can be difficult to understand what you may be eligible for and how to apply. The drop in session is a useful opportunity to speak to myself and an advisor from the Department for Work and Pensions to find out what support may be in place, ask any questions about how to apply and check that you are receiving all of the benefits you are entitled to. 
